





- Key text: "Beside the ship's baggage..." (23-24; six paragraphs)







- When the unexpected visitors arrive at the door, the priests disagree. Who is right? Why?
- How does Rodrigues view Kichijiro now? What do you think?
- Key text: "The next event..." (37-38)




- How do you view the reasoning behind the separating of the priests under the threat of persecution?
- Could it be said that Rodrigues is in some sort of denial about the situation he is facing? If so, why?
- Key texts: "I suppose..." (57); "I have heard..." (63-64, two paragraphs);
 "In the afternoon..." (71-73, seven paragraphs)

- What do you think about the decision by Rodrigues not to apostatize?
- How much is Kichijiro responsible for this situation?
- Is the new point of view 3rd person limited or omniscient? What is Endo's intent? Is it effective? How?
- Key text: "Since he had no rosary..." (91)
- Where does Rodrigues find comfort while in the prison? Explain how this is possible.
- What does Rodrigues learn about martyrdom?
- Key text: "Only the old man..." (117, five paragraphs)




- What is your assessment of Inoue?
- Why does Rodrigues desire others to save themselves by apostatizing, but resists doing so himself?
- What lies at the heart of Rodrigues' disagreement with Ferreira?
- Key text: "They did not believe..." (160-161, seven paragraphs)
- Why has Kichijiro continued to follow Rodrigues all this time?
- What is it that finally leads Rodrigues to trample the fumie? Is this an act of courage or weakness? What point is Endo making here?
- Key text: "Ah!" (176-177, seven paragraphs)

- Why is there still emotional distance between Ferreira and Rodrigues?
- How has trampling the fumie changed Rodrigues, if at all?
- Do you feel somewhat mentally exhausted at this point in the novel?
- Key text: "The remembrance..." (187, two paragraphs)
- Why does Endo alter the narrative structure in Chapter 10? What is the effect for the reader?
- What is your final assessment of Kichijiro?
- Key text: "Father..." (202-end)



Ch. 9-10

- Why does Endo conclude the novel with the Diary? What is your interpretation of the Appendix specifically, in what ways does it clarify themes in the novel?
- As time permits, look at the <u>Silence</u> <u>Questions</u> in the Junk Drawer in preparation for the IO, and to help you choose a paper topic.
